Perhaps you use your officer installation gatherings to reveal your chorus' Sweet Adeline of the Year. How do we manage that when we can't gather? Let me suggest a few things you can do. The possibilities are only limited by the creative ideas that can be generated by your membership. Don't be afraid to tap into the creative. Here are a few ideas.....

- Continue to find ways to meet online. Even for our computer challenged members there are ways to find to gather for just a bit of social times. If you need/want some specific ideas of how to do this and how to make it work, reach out to our Communications Coordinator, Nikki Burkhardt. She is a gem and will gladly help.
- If you need to elect officers into your administrative groups in your choruses, there are some online options for you as well. Be reminded that the "formal" installation gathering that many of us are used to is not vital to facilitate a change over in open leadership positions. Each chorus should have a nomination officer who can contact individuals interested in serving your chorus. That possible slate needs to be presented to the membership with at least 2 week's notice prior the election process. Those slates can be sent out to chorus members via email, private FaceBook pages, in any way that you normally stay in contact with your members.
- When the time comes for a vote, you will want to give your members the opportunity for anonymous vote. Appoint your election officers and create a Survey Monkey survey that only they see the responses for. This is a simple, easy and free way to get your responses back.
- Sweet Adeline of the Year? A suggestion would be to include an option in your Survey Monkey that will allow your members to submit a name. Add a field in the survey asking each member for their own name. That way you know that everyone has voted. Name your outgoing Sweet Adeline of the Year as one of the election officers so she is aware of who she will honor at a later time.
- Once we are free and comfortable meeting together, make that a great party celebration and honor your new officers and Sweet Adeline of the Year at that time. It will be an awesome time of reconnection and celebration.

Just a couple of ideas for you....remember that these are only ideas and are only as limited as you allow your imagination to be. Your RMT is here for you. We hope that each and every one is healthy and safe. Reach out to us if you need help (or simply another creative mind). We will keep you informed on all the great things that make us say – "I AM SWEET ADELINES".




































MEMBERSHIP CORNER


"Of course they will, I have no doubt, the songs will come again!"
