#### **REGIONAL GOVERNANCE**

Regional governance is a hot topic for RMTs across Sweet Adelines right now. While the Regional Management Team (RMT) structure in Region 19 has been a highly effective model for regional management for many years, many regions had expressed growing concerns and issues with the management of their regions. Issues included concerns with a disconnect between the Region & the International Board of Directors (IBOD); struggles with communication and delegation skills; too many members on an RMT making consensus difficult on key decisions; issues with team effectiveness without a recognized leader; lack of clarity in roles/responsibilities; struggles with developing future leaders that require International focus.

The IBOD assigned 2 task force teams the responsibility of looking at our current administrative format (Regional Management Teams (RMT)) to determine if our current leadership model was effectively meeting the needs of the regions. The outcome of these task forces was the development of new leadership model.

The 2 leadership options are:

**Current model:** Regional Management Team (RMT) -- The RMT is a team of 6-8 leaders (Team Leader, Education Coordinator, Finance Coordinator, Membership Coordinator, Events Coordinator, Marketing Coordinator, and Directors Coordinator) who have focused areas of management. Team members are responsible for their area of expertise, supporting their counterparts at the chorus/chapter level and providing programming in support of all regional members. Management decisions are made by consensus with recommendations being revised until all members of the team are in agreement prior to implementation. RMT positions have term limits of a max of three consecutive 2-year terms.

**Proposed model:** Regional Executive Committee (REC) -- The REC is a team of 3 leaders (Regional Administrative Director, Regional Education Director, and Regional Membership Director) who apply for their position and are appointed by Sweet Adelines. The responsibilities that fall under each Director are broken into smaller "jobs" that are held by Resource Team members (i.e. Marketing, Prospective Chapter Liaison, Revitalization Liaison, etc.). The REC reports directly to an International Leadership Specialist who reports to the Education Direction Committee (a subset of the IBOD). While there are no term limits for the 3 Director positions, the primary function of each is to cultivate future leaders and identify their successor.

When the new model was first presented to regional leaders there was much concern that this untested program would cause upheaval in regions that were working effectively under the RMT model. The International Board heard those concerns and opened up the opportunity for regions to pilot the new program for a 2 year period of time. Fourteen regions opted to pilot the new governance model. Region 19 opted not to participate as it was felt that our leadership method was working successfully with the consensus model being an effective tool for decision making in our region.

The pilot program is now coming to a close and all RMTs will be voting in January to determine whether or not to institute the new governance structure.

Your RMT members have been discussing the possible change in structure, culling input from regions who participated in the pilot to determine what worked well and what didn't. We've reached out to our counterparts to see how they were able to fill the resource positions, how often they meet with their teams and how often the REC meets. We've asked what the strengths and weaknesses are of the program and what they would change if the vote results in an organization-wide implementation of the REC model. We will be discussing all the input we've gleaned at our January RMT meeting after Singer's School before submitting our regional vote to Internationals.

## **Meet the Region 19 Education Team**

**Rose Hershey (Quartet Promotions)** 

I began my Sweet Adeline education when I was roughly 10 years old in the back seat of my mother's car. She played learning tracks for the songs she was learning and I found that I loved the sound of the music she was singing and would often learn the songs right along with her.

When I was a bit older, I decided to give the chorus experience a try with Red Rose City Chorus. It was so much fun but there were other interests that pulled me away from the chorus and into a world of dance which I continued throughout my high school years. However, I rarely missed a competition or show that the chorus was involved in..... I still knew many of the songs.

It wasn't until after graduating that I decided that I wanted to return to the chorus and have the time to sing with my mom. Since returning to Sweet Adeline life, I have enjoyed becoming more involved in chorus activities including becoming more involved in the visual product and choreography as well as serving as our Communications Coordinator and a member of the chorus management team.

Last year I found a new love in the Sweet Adeline world – QUARTETING!!! On Memorial Day weekend of 2018 I found 4 other young



women who had come to love this art form as much as I do and we formed Starling 4. It has already been an exciting time making music with them and I just love it. This has led me to become more involved on a regional level so, when asked, I agreed to serve Region 19 as Quartet Promotion Coordinator. I look forward to meeting and working with the wonderful quartets and future quarteters of this region.

### **MEMBERSHIP CORNER**

"We post ads on Facebook, list rehearsals on MeetUp and NextDoor, put fliers up in local stores, and still no one comes to visit our chorus! What are we doing wrong?"

Sound familiar? If you've been wondering why your recruitment efforts haven't yielded dozens of new members, perhaps looking at the reasons why people don't join choirs will give us ideas for countering those wrong impressions.

Chris Rowbury, a workshop and choir leader in the UK, shared on the ChoirPlace blog his "10 reasons why people don't join choirs (but love to sing)." #### 1. I'm too embarrassed and frightened to sing in front of others

This is understandable if someone has not sung in the company of others for a long time. I try always to point out that everyone else probably feels the same and that nobody will be put on the spot or asked to sing solo.

The beauty of large groups singing together is that people can 'hide' in the big sound and only come more forward when they are ready.

Take away: Promote your chorus as a supportive group of women who are focused on community and singing, together.

#### 2. I think that 'choirs' are formal, stuffy and boring

The word 'choir' does conjure up images of endless school assemblies or long church services or rows of posh people dressed up and standing stiffly singing music that we can't really relate to. However, there are many, many different kinds of 'choir' out there and there will be one to suit every taste.

Take away: Make sure your promotional material feature the fun of singing in your chorus.

#### 3. I'll need to be 'musical' and able to read notation and understand music

Some choirs indeed require certain musical knowledge, but there are countless choirs and open-access singing workshops that don't assume any kind of musical knowledge or previous singing experience. Lots of these teach songs by ear and never even hand out lyric sheets.

Take away: Dispel this fear by sharing your chorus process for learning music with your guests on the first visit.

#### 4. It will be full of old people!

Yes it's true: many established choirs tend to consist mainly of people over 40. This can put off younger singers. However, from my experience, I've worked with groups whose ages range from 18 to 80 and it's simply not an issue as everyone is connected by their common love of singing.

Take away: PR materials should include pictures of your current ensemble, highlighting ALL demographics.

#### 5. I won't know the songs

When joining an established choir, it will almost certainly already have a repertoire of songs. However, in a one-day workshop, everyone will be in the same boat as all the songs will be fresh and new. Even if someone does know a song already, they certainly won't know the particular harmony arrangement. In fact, it's often harder to learn an arrangement of a song if you know the melody already. (CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE)

In most choirs, new members are gently led into the old repertoire, and every new season starts with songs that are brand new to everyone, so there's no chance of you getting left behind!

Take away: Let prospective participants know that you have a plan for learning repertoire for all new members.

#### 6. I'm too busy and certainly don't have the time to make a regular commitment

This mainly comes from blokes I have to say. I guess many men put their jobs before their own pleasure and leisure. It's strange how we have many women in choirs who have high-powered jobs and families, yet they manage to find the time to come and sing.

Really, is it *that* much of a time commitment, especially for those who say they **love** to sing? Two hours a week, or maybe five hours on a Saturday. Surely you can find time in your busy schedule to do something you love?

Take away: Explore short-term recruitment options like Holiday Caroling or Contest Only membership. Once you get them in the door, you'll have a chance to hook them on the hobby.

#### 7. Singing together is old-fashioned and usually religious or classical

It may *seem* to be old-fashioned, but that doesn't detract from the fun and enjoyment that can be had. Dancing is old-fashioned too and has been around for millennia!

Most people know singing together from church or by seeing classical concerts, yet there are many, many choirs and singing groups throughout the country who don't sing religious or classical music. Their choir sessions are fun and vibrant, nothing old-fashioned or dated about them.

Take away: Video promotion of your chorus is a great way to show the fun that we have in Sweet Adelines.

#### 8. I don't know how to find a suitable choir or singing workshop

Google is a wonderful thing. Most choirs and people who run singing workshops have websites these days. Just type in 'choir' or 'singing workshop' and your location and something's bound to come up.

Take away: Take full advantage of the internet to promote your chorus. Keep your Facebook page upto-date, post on Instagram from rehearsals, log your rehearsals on sites like MeetUp and NextDoor, publish ads in local newspapers and send in press releases to get the support of the local news media in promoting your ensemble.

#### 9. I'm terrible at remembering words and tunes

Me too! Many people don't like being in that strange state where they don't quite know what they are doing and are a bit lost. It's not a nice feeling. But you have to be patient and allow plenty of time to get a tune and the words under your belt. It's about trusting the process and making mistakes as you become more familiar with a song.

Many people think they can't 'sing' because they imagine that 'proper' singers only need to hear a song once before they know it perfectly. They don't realise that even professional singers can take several months to really learn a song and make it their own. Like most things, learning songs gets easier with practice.

Take away: Reserve time each rehearsal for guests to go off with a member of the chorus to learn the ins and outs of chorus membership. Select women who will share their experiences at conquering their fears of joining the chorus as well. (CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE)

## 10. I'm too scared to perform in public, I just want to have fun

Many community choirs in this country never perform in public, there are also plenty of singing for pleasure groups who just meet to sing together with no thought of anyone outside the group hearing them.

Even if you join a choir that performs, it is usually not compulsory to perform. However, as you get more confident as a singer I'm sure you'll want to share the wonderful sound with an audience.

Take away: Consider alternative membership options to attract and retain singers looking for musical fulfillment in different ways. Many choruses have contest-only membership, why not rehearsal-only?

Thinking about trying a Free-Voice Lesson program or a short-term membership drive like a Holiday Singers program next year? Join me Saturday afternoon at Singers School for a session on popular singer driven recruitment programs.

The DCP is an educational, home-study program designed to develop skills for Sweet Adelines International directors, potential directors and musical leaders. Much of the information contained within the DCP Resource Modules, one of the resources available, is useful for ALL chorus members.

If you are currently an Assistant Director or a Section Leader or think you might like to consider those roles in the future, this may be a great way to spend the winter months and learn a little bit more about what, why, where, and how directors make the decisions they do. The program is self-paced. You can go as quickly or slowly as you choose to go. There are Musical/Technical Topics in the course such as Vocal Production, Music Theory, Judging Categories, and Analytical Listening. There are also modules in Management/Communication including Organizational Knowledge, Teaching Skills, and Rehearsal Planning.

Registration is through Sweet Adelines International and the fee to enroll in the program is \$100. You will also need to purchase the resource modules for the course but these are resources that I go back to regularly – and so will you!

#### SWEET ADELINES INTERNATIONAL INTERNATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS 283<sup>RD</sup> (MIDYEAR) MEETING

#### **INTERNATIONAL UPDATE**

The International Board of Directors met on October 14, 2018, in St. Louis, Missouri. Following is a summary of actions taken.

The Board approved the advancement of Shirley Kout to International Judging Program emerita status.

The Board was pleased to learn that two grants had been awarded by the Young Singers Foundation Advancement Committee for events that support the advancement of barbershop harmony for young women.

The Board discussed topics identified in the State of the Region reports.

The Board reviewed the organization's current financial status, as well as progress on the short-term Strategic Action Plan and budget.

The Board received a report on the status of arranged and published music licensing. Staff continues to work diligently with both Hal Leonard and Alfred Publishing to obtain licenses for their music titles.

The Board was pleased to learn that Hal Leonard has renewed our contract to sell their arranged music for the next three years.

The Board reviewed an Information Technology (IT) advisory services consultant proposal and the expected outcomes of the project to strengthen Sweet Adelines IT systems and capability.

The Board reviewed a proposal from a documentary filmmaker (grandson and nephew to Sweet Adelines) to create a film about a chorus or choruses competing at the international competition. The Board approved further discussions with the filmmaker by our Marketing and Communications Department.

The Board reviewed and approved the job description for a new Board Resource Advisory Committee. The mandate of the committee is to advise the Board of Directors and Nominating Committee on the selection of new board directors who possess the appropriate combination of skills and experience for board service, and to nurture, educate, and assess the training needs of new and current board members and the board as a whole (standing committee job descriptions are included in the Policy Book, which can be found on the website: Members Only, Operations, Document Center tab).

The Board agreed to institute a new standing committee, the Director's Certification Program Review Committee to review and propose revisions for the DCP modules (standing committee job descriptions are included in the Policy Book, which can be found on the website: Members Only, Operations, Document Center tob

The Board reviewed materials for the Arranger Certification Program.

The Board reviewed plans for the November 2018 Strategic Visioning Retreat. The purpose of the retreat is to "create a 10-year vision and strategic framework to support a relevant and thriving global community of members sharing their love of singing, learning and honing their talents, and strengthening their bonds of sisterhood." The expected outcomes of the retreat are "a clear and compelling vision, and fully engaged leaders energized by their decisions and ready to create innovative options and strategies for wisely using the organization's relationships and resources to evolve the organization's infrastructure and capabilities." Plans include the preparation of communications to share the retreat outcomes post-retreat, including a report in the April 2019 *Pitch Pipe*.







## **HEART OF MARYLAND**

We are delighted to feature one of Region 19's newest quartets, Electric Avenue, especially because of our personal ties to the group. Three of the quartet's members are or have been affiliated with the Heart of Maryland. Rona Kronenberg (baritone) is a current member of the Hearts; Donna Vincent Roa (lead) and Katie Reutemann (tenor) are former "Hearts". Adriana ("Adri") Scholle, bass, Donna and Katie are currently members of Harbor City Music Company (HCMC).

Named after a 1980's hit song, Electric Avenue came together in July 2017 at a HCMC Mix and Match; all of them had sung in other quartets. In January 2018 Electric Avenue sang together for the first time. The quartet registered with SAI in May of 2018 and performed a three-song entertainment package to become qualified with the Heart of Maryland and HCMC. One of their first performances was on September 22 at a 60<sup>th</sup> birthday party, and the quartet was featured at the Heart of Maryland's Halloween show in October.

Electric Avenue is proud to announce that it has been granted a 2019 Maryland Traditions Apprenticeship Award by the Maryland State Arts Council. Donna, the Grants Coordinator for HCMC, worked with Lustre (the 2017 SAI Queens of Harmony) to submit the application for the award. According to the award notice, "A jury of folklife specialists convened to review applications and found [Electric Avenue's] to be the most compelling." The Apprenticeship Award will allow Electric Avenue to work with Lustre to receive a full year of private vocal instruction and quartet coaching. In December the Maryland State Arts Council will conduct an audio interview and arrange a photo shoot with the two quartets to highlight their accomplishments. The award also requires Electric Avenue to perform at the National Folk Festival in September 2019 in Salisbury, Maryland.













Donna, a member of SAI for four years, states that "quarteting provides a great learning opportunity for singers and a performance experience beyond the chorus setting. We seek to improve our skills in barbershop singing and build a repertoire for Region 19's annual competition and as well as for performances in our local community. The apprenticeship has jump started our collective barbershop quartet journey and gives us an opportunity to improve exponentially as individual barbershop singers and improve our ability to perform as a dynamic foursome." Donna contributes a number of skills that are important to the success of the quartet: organization, business acumen, brand identity, grant writing and communication.

Rona, an 11-year member of SAI, has always liked watching the regional quartet competition and decided several years ago that she wanted to be onstage in a quartet. In addition to her singing expertise, Rona's ability to book performances and arrange for costuming have been invaluable to the quartet.

Katie has been a member of SAI for 15 years. Asked what she sees as the goals for the quartet, she states, "We'd like to perform and compete at our highest possible level while enjoying each other's friendship. We hope to grow individually as singers and improve our quartet sound as much as we are able."




We had a lovely time exploring Salzburg.


