## **Attention Region 19 Chapter Presidents/Team Leaders**:

Once again this year, the Annual Regional Evaluations (AREs) are being processed through International Headquarters using an online survey tool. Be sure to check your email to find a link that will take you to the 2017-18 Annual Regional Evaluation (ARE). Click on the link and follow the directions, completing the survey one time only for your chorus.

When you click the "Submit" button at the bottom of the survey, a copy of your responses will be emailed to you and your responses will be ready for review by your Regional leaders and the Regional Leadership Committee.

The survey has been programmed to allow you to revise your responses after the survey is submitted. The "revision" feature also makes it possible to save a partially-completed survey and return to finish it later (simply scroll to the bottom of the survey and click "Submit" to record a completed or partially-completed survey).

The deadline for completing the survey is July 31, 2018. Please make every effort to complete the survey by that date as the Regional Leadership Committee will be reviewing the responses at their August meeting.

#### Lines from Lori Jo

What an honor and a joy to return to the Regional Management Team 19 as the Education Coordinator. If you were a member of this region in the last century, you might recall that I served in regional leadership for 12 years and have continued as a member of the Regional Faculty.

A few things have changed in my life between that era and now. I direct two barbershop choruses (Vocal Harmonix (women) and Red Rose Chorus (men). I am an officer on two different state and regional rabbit club boards and 4-H volunteer. Chairing the rabbit department at the PA Farm Show is still a huge passion for me and it's much easier now that I retired from teaching in the Harrisburg City School District. Our daughters are on their own. Tom and I have become grandparents with two wonderful grandsons and one more on the way this summer. We love to travel and plan to spend as much time as possible in Delaware this summer at our family-owned BeachHaus and on our new pontoon boat.

As a veteran member of the Region 19 Faculty, I have visited almost every chorus in our region at some point in time. In the past 12 months, I visited Pride of Baltimore, Lehigh Valley, Sing! Shenandoah, Freedom Valley, Harmony on the Bay, Altoona, DelMarVa, and Diamond State Choruses. I have four more chorus visits on my calendar for this summer. So what have I done in my first month as Education Coordinator? My Education Team is in place and listed below this article. The Regional Faculty has been redesigned and ready for training. The Chorus Visit program has been revised and is ready to roll. Classes for FLASH have been selected. A PVI Coordinator has been appointed to coordinate that popular program. Classes for Singer's School are in a list and that schedule will be assembled shortly.

The one major change that might affect your chorus is the revision to the Chorus Visit program. We are continuing with the practice of funding three visits to every chorus. Some choruses qualify for six visits (director search, revitalization, etc). However, the funding for these visits will be for using the members of the Region 19 Faculty only. We are discontinuing the non-faculty coaching grants to redirect those monies into training programs. The faculty we have is diverse in their talents. Maybe you'd like to have a tag singing night, or section leader training, or a strategic planning session. What about a class or help with song selection or your performance package. Maybe a mix and match quartet night. Think outside the box. We are here to help you achieve your goals and keep it fun.

#### MEMBERSHIP CORNER

#### Chorus Culture is Key to Membership Growth

Membership coordinators across the organization are asked, "What can we do to increase our chorus membership?" There are many membership drive programs promoted by Sweet Adelines from Ready-Set-Grow to Free Voice Lessons, but I am finding that the most successful choruses are ones where the Core Values, Mission & Vision of the chorus are well-established and supported by 100% of the chorus members. When a chorus is united in knowing who they area, they are more likely to attract others to them. Let's take a look at these 3 terms and how they can help (or harm) your retention and recruitment activities.

#### Core Values = Beliefs

Core values are the fundamental beliefs of a person or organization. Your chorus' core values tell why your organization is unique and why members stay. While each member may have a different reason for staying, there is usually an overall set of values that is unique to each chapter.

#### Mission vs. Vision:

A Mission Statement explains WHY you exist while a Vision Statement is a one that describes clear and inspirational long-term change as a result of your work.

Successful choruses work together to determine their core values, mission & vision before putting it to paper. This isn't something your Director and Board/Management Team create on their own – every member has a voice in the process and must believe in the finished product for true unity to be created.

So now that we have defined what these statements are, how do they impact our membership? From a retention standpoint it's easy to see that when members are not in agreement with the Mission & Vision of the ensemble, they are not likely to stay. For example, if your vision is steeped in contest scores resulting in months of working primarily on contest music and passing qualification standards and your membership includes singers who would rather learn new music and sing for the community – those members are likely to be discontent with their membership and seek alternate opportunities.

How about recruitment? A chorus without a current mission/vision that is agreed upon by the members may have varying definitions of the chorus. If some members see the chorus as a performing group with space on the risers for anyone who loves to sing and others see the chorus as a high level contest ensemble seeking experienced singers – we, likely, have conflict & frustration on the risers – especially during recruitment activities.

If your chorus is considering revisiting your Mission & Vision statements, here are some questions to get you started:

#### **Mission Statement Questions:**

- 1. Start with a story: Imagine a real person making the decision to join your chapter. Why does she want to join? What drew her to your chorus? What will keep her coming back? This defines your TARGET MEMBER.
- 2. Define how your potential member's life will be better because of chapter membership: Start your mission statement with the good you do for members and leadership.
- 3. Consider what your chapter does for the community: Our chapter's positive impact on communities, through performances, education, or philanthropy are an integral backstory for the mission statement.
- 4. Add what the chorus does for established members: How have your members' lives been changed through chapter membership? Why do your members stay in the chorus?
- 5. Edit, polish, review, and revise: Whatever you wrote for points 2 4 above, edit, streamline, and polish. Cut as much as you can that isn't unique to your chorus and avoid buzzwords or jargon that aren't universal.

#### **Vision Statement Questions:**

- 1. Your vision should align to your mission. Now that you know who you are and what you do, where do you see yourself in five to ten years?
- 2. Your vision should be unique to your chapter and what you can provide. Do you see yourselves as educators? Performers? Competitors? All of the above?
- 3. Keep the vision simple enough for people inside and outside the organization to understand.
- 4. Your vision should be ambitious enough to be exciting but not so ambitious that it seems unachievable.
- 5. Edit, polish, review, and revise: Whatever you wrote for points 1 4 above, edit, streamline, and polish. Cut as much as you can that isn't unique to your chorus and avoid buzzwords or jargon that isn't universal.

Example: Scenic City Chorus - Region 4

The chorus members enthusiastically educate and entertain others as they strive for musical excellence. They hold themselves, as a group and as individuals, to high standards which will foster growth and a bright future for this sisterhood of singers.

## "The Voices" Novice Quartet Contest

You will be excited to know that we're bringing back the "The Voices" Novice Quartet competition at FLASH 2018. Quartets who qualify as novices (no more than two members can have competed in a regional quartet contest) must apply by **June 22nd**, **2018** (application follows) to enter the competition at FLASH. Then the quartet will be paired with a team of two Silver Sorority members who have volunteered their time to work with the quartets for a minimum of 7.5 hours (three sessions at 2.5 hrs. each.)

Each quartet should prepare two contestable songs. The contest will be on Friday night at FLASH 2018. The winning quartet will be eligible to be reimbursed for their 2019 Regional Quartet Contest registration fee, should they choose to compete.

So, if you are in the process of forming a new quartet or have an established quartet which has been sitting on the competition sidelines for a while, don't delay! Be sure to get in on the free coaching and all of the fun and excitement of a novice contest before the real novice contest at regional convention! We'll have actual judges judging the contest and you'll get great comments and useful suggestions to help guide your work as a quartet together.

## \$\$\$\$ Ready. Set. Grants! (rerun from last month) \$\$\$\$\$

Is your chorus interested in bringing in new funding to support current activities, expand your creative vision, or create new activities? Does your chorus have an interest in accessing funds that you don't have to pay back? If you answered yes to both questions for your chorus, then you should explore grant funding.

Grant-making organizations, particularly in the arts and humanities, want to expand community access to art and music and seek to connect with non-profits, like SAI choruses, that will help them to meet their goals. While some organizations offer grants for a clearly defined event or activity, **some provide operational support grants that can be used for any purpose**. These grants help choruses to expand programming, buy new costumes or set materials, strengthen overall finances, and more.

#### **Is Your Chorus Grant-Ready?**

Having a grant portfolio requires that your chorus examines closely your goals, how you document your successes, and the extent to which you can engage member volunteers to support a new or expanding grants portfolio.



It's important to ask three important questions: 1) How ready is your organization to start, step up, or strengthen the grants activity? 2) Do you have members who are willing to document chorus activities and achievements and help you to write persuasive and compelling grant applications? 3) Are you willing to invest the time it takes to carry out what you say you will do as per the grant requirements and deliver on the semi and annual reporting of activities?

To ensure success in a grants portfolio, the management team should designate a grants coordinator whose singular focus is to examine, inventory, and expand the chorus' assets (e.g., director bio, management team contact information, activity summaries, audiences reached, organizational goals, success metrics, etc.). These items will be used to write grants and provide evidence that your chorus is worthy of a grant.

Additional items may need to be developed depending on a specific grant's requirements. This may require conducting interviews with chorus and activity leaders to gather additional information to support the application. (CONTINUES...)

Following and teaching (skills transfer) a repeatable grants production process can help ensure that you create efficiencies in how you build, operate, and deliver a successful grants portfolio.

#### **Researching Relevant Grants for Barbershop Choruses**

When you research grants, you need to find grant making organizations that have the **eligibility standards that your chorus can meet**. Examine very carefully evaluation criteria to determine exactly what makes a successful submission. Make sure you read the fine print and immerse yourself in the essence of the opportunity.

Creatively echo the goals of the grant in your application. Know that the fit doesn't have to be a 100% match. You should think somewhat outside of the box, as it may expand the thinking of the review board. Be unique and different in your approach. But, be careful not to go too far outside of the stated requirements and give them a reason to say no to your application. It's a fine line to maneuver.

**Never underestimate the time it takes to find relevant grants**. They do exist, but sometimes it feels like you are exploring a very deep gold mine. You know there's gold there, but you have to do a lot of digging to find it. In addition to aggressive searching on the web using key search terms, you can set up a Google Alert using relevant terms (e.g., grants, music, performance grants, arts and humanities grants) and include your location to further fine-tune the results that you get in that alert.

Once you hit pay dirt, grant **organizations like to establish long-term relationships with grantees**, and while you have to apply year after year, one is likely to experience a higher hit rate/win rate with grant-making organizations that have proof you can deliver on the requirements of their grant.

#### **How Members Can Support the Grant Process**

- Create a chorus "documentation mindset" and a "grants-winning mindset"
- Proactively flag items for the grants coordinator that help tell your chorus story
- Take photos of your audiences to show numbers, type, diversity, etc.
- Take photos of your activities and volunteer contributions
- Actively look for grants and inform the grants coordinator in a timely manner
- Volunteer as a grant portfolio ambassadors to assist the grant coordinator
- Attend foundation grant orientations and workshops for grantees
- Expect information requests from the grant coordinator that substantiate chorus success
- Dream about how you can spend the extra money from winning new grants!

Donna Vincent Roa, the new Grants Coordinator for Harbor City Music Company, wrote this article. In the past five months, she has written one grant request for funds report for an existing grant, submitted three grant applications, and has won one grant master-apprentice folklife arts grant for quartet training.

So, what has Judy done for our chorus? The list is long. Here are excerpts from a piece that was presented at the dinner:

Judy first came to Freedom Valley Chorus in November of 2007. She quickly joined us, singing in the baritone section. In just a few short weeks, our director at that time chose to resign from the chorus. She asked Judy if she wanted to step into the helm. Judy accepted the challenge and filled that role, but since Judy was very new to Sweet Adelines, we conducted a director search. Judy graciously acted as interim director until our new director joined us in March of 2008. At that time, Judy happily joined us on the risers again. After all, she said she had originally joined us because she wanted to sing. 
The members of the task force are from choruses all over the country. We meet through webinars so scheduling with our different time zones can be challenging. Therese Antonini chairs this task force. We are




