

MEMBERSHIP COORDINATOR

There is much to be learned from the experiences of others. Last fiscal year, we analyzed the results of the membership survey done in Region 34 and learned what we, too, could do better in the areas of retention and recruitment.

We looked at mission/vision statements, talked about blind surveys of our chorus members to get a better sense of where improvement was needed, planned guest night to ensure that visitors had an experienced that inspired them to return. We looked at why people don't join choirs, what we are doing RIGHT as an organization, how to recognize our members so they know how important they are to us and how to support our new members.

If you need a refresher on any of these topics, I encourage you to head to the regional website where prior editions of the Barbershop Beat are archived for your use.

This year, we're going more internal. There is so much to learn from the experiences of our own members. I've asked a group of Region 19 members from a variety of demographics to share how they found Sweet Adelines. Each month's story will include tips on how you can apply the recruitment method shared with your own chorus.



Speaking of recruitment – make plans to join me at the Membership Class at F.L.A.S.H. this September. EDUCATION COORDINATOR

Learn Something New Every Day

In psychology, the four stages of learning have been described with these terms:

- Unconscious Incompetence (I don't know what I don't know)
- Conscious Incompetence (I know about it but I still make mistakes or don't know how to do it)
- Conscious Competence (I know this and can do it when I concentrate)
- Unconscious Competence (I can to this without thinking and can teach this to others)

As barbershop performers, the competition experience helps to move us along through these stages in many ways. Just last month, we had many quartets and choruses go up a level and down a level. We gave out amazing awards recognizing achievement. We received suggestions of what to do next to move our skills through the four stages of learning through the scoresheets from our judging panel and our own self-evaluation of our video recordings. It is a wonderful and fun way to end a year. The list of winners is listed elsewhere in this newsletter, so I will use my space to congratulate all who chose to compete this year. I strongly urge any quartet or chorus that did not compete to consider this experience next year as a goal.

Instead, as the Education Coordinator, I am compelled to address what we can learn from the mistake made by a dear friend of mine at the Saturday Night Show. Carol Ludwig and I have been friends for many decades and served in leadership positions together when I had this position in the last century. We all know her as one of the best MCs around and look forward to the joy she brings to a show when we are all very tired from a long weekend of competing. After the firestorm created on social media was made fully known to me, I called Carol early Sunday morning while Irene Hershey drafted a public response from the Region's RMT. You all received a letter from our International president about this and conversations and dialogs have not yet slowed down.

As a chorus director, I realize that I set the tone for the culture of our chorus at every rehearsal and performance. We know how we are, and know our community well so our song selection, emcee material, and visual performance work for us. I have been very selective in the songs that I choose for our chorus, and yet I still make mistakes. We just tossed out a song that I learned was unsettling to one (and maybe more) of our own chorus members.

Now what is the Region going to do about this? That was the social media statement that has propelled me into action of awareness. As the Education Coordinator, it is my responsibility to bring educational opportunities in all areas of singing and performing to our members. I attended the Diversity Café at the 2018 International Convention and learned from the stories shared by individuals who have felt marginalized all over our organization and it heightened my own awareness in many areas. After the social media firestorm exploded following our convention, I reached out to a few peers for personal experiences. Following this article you will see that Sherry Stanton has written a wonderful article of personal reflections that show how she and her chorus have chosen to learn from the Saturday Night Show experience.

My door is open for conversation. I hope to see you at the June 22nd Leadership Academy where Thérése Antonini, Chair of the Diversity Task Force, will be leading us in expanding out skills as leaders. We will all be together again in September at F.L.A.S.H. and then some Area Day School in January. My you move up a stage in the learning ladder one step at a time.

There'll Be Some Changes Made...in our chorus, at least

This is the time of year when choruses are setting goals and working out who the chorus wants to be and what it wants to get done over the next year. This year, our discussion included talking about sensitivity to offensive lyrics in potentially innocent songs, in the wake of the "sing-along incident" at Regional, where the audience sang *Swanee* by Al Jolson, and that caused some people pain; as a song that includes some uncomfortable racial stereotyping. It just goes to prove that no matter how innocent we try to be of gaffes like that, we have a way to go before we're totally considerate of the feelings of ALL of our audiences.

This incident made my chorus go through our own repertoire for inadvertent racial references, and we found two songs that contain some uncomfortable lyrics for the 21st Century: *Alexander's Ragtime Band*, and *Fever*. We agreed as a chorus that we need to remove these songs from our repertoire.

This was especially a surprise to us, because we pride ourselves on being a chorus of progressive, forward-thinking women. And it brought up some really great questions, that I think every group needs to answer for itself. We've certainly made repertoire decisions with cultural sensitivity in mind...and we revisited some of those in our discussion to see just how progressive they are.

Our chorus chooses to sing only secular Christmas songs, because a large percentage of our chorus is non-Christian. Those singers are team players about doing Christmas repertoire, but in consideration of them and our audiences, we stick to secular music for the vast majority of our holiday rep. That suits us, and our DC metro area audiences, a little better than hymns, but we understand that there are plenty of places where hymns might be considered a wonderful addition to people's Christmas experience. It's just not for us.

We changed "when we do the Zulu Twist" to "when we dance and do the twist" in the *Dr*. *Jazz* medley because it offended us. In our recent discussion, the question arose -- if you take the racist references out of a song, does that actually ease the discomfort of those who recognize the origin? These days, it's a rare group indeed who would sing the *Hot Town Strutter's Ball*, given its origins, even though with the exception of the lyrics, it's an awesome barbershop uptune.

We've stopped characterizing overtly flirty "double entendre" songs, because we have members who are not comfortable personally with doing that characterization -- although we sing Beginning to See the Light, we don't put much "let's make whoopie" into the double entendre.

As a director, I've made some music-selection mistakes that the chorus immediately reacted to -- the seemingly innocent *Fun in Just One Lifetime* was roundly panned because its lyrics imply that the only way to be happy in life is to raise a family, not a choice that all of our singers have made, and we have trouble selling a "you should live this way" message. So, we don't sing it. And, another lesson taken in how far we need to go as individuals to be sensitive to other people's perspectives. Although I'm one of the people who chose not to raise a family, it never even crossed my mind that this would be an offensive lyric for some people.

So in a world where social change is happening so fast that it's easy to step over a line that wasn't there yesterday, how do we navigate the minefield?

The rule our chorus adopted for these decisions was the famous quote from Maya Angelou, "I did then what I knew how to do. Now that I know better, I do better." I like this, because it doesn't let us off the hook for our past decisions, but lets us focus on fixing the problem rather than indulging guilt and shame.

Progress for us goes one step at a time, and this is our step. I'm opening the discussion (with some kind prompting from our Education Coordinator)...anybody else got a contribution about how your chorus makes these choices?

Keeping Up with the Region's Google Calendar



For definitive answers we look no further than to our resident oenophile, **Vicki Stokes**, a member of Heart of Maryland and Sweet Adelines International for 30 years. Vicki is a tasting room associate for Black Ankle Vineyards in Mt. Airy, Maryland. The owners of the Vineyards, Sarah O'Herron and Edward Boyce, began their first plantings of grapes in 2003 and 2004 and opened for business in October 2008. Black Ankle Vineyards offers tastings by the glass, a wine club, catered dinners featuring their wines, and barrel tastings. Vicki discovered Black Ankle Vineyards through neighbors who visited the Vineyards' tasting room on Friday nights to drink wine and enjoy the musical entertainment that the Vineyards' owners provide. Vicki began working at the winery in 2016; she prepares the tasting room for events, packs members' shipments, greets visitors and even polishes the wine glasses. "My husband really pushed me to work for Sarah and Edward," said Vicki. "My mother was living with us, and I was her primary caregiver, so he thought it would be a great place for me to relax. I am not much of a 'do nothing' person. I don't seem to be able to sit still. The job is fun, the staff is wonderful and the great customers keep me there."

At our Retreat in March our practice area was converted into a "mobile tasting room." Vicki brought several bottles of wine from Black Ankle Vineyards for us to taste. For those of us who are not wine connoisseurs it was fun to sample wines with such divergent flavors. Says Vicki, "For someone whose previous knowledge was 'open bottle, drink wine', I have learned so much, such as grafting, planting roots from satellite, blending, fermenting, bottle shock, etc."

To say that Vicki is not a 'do-nothing' person is definitely an understatement. Currently in the Heart of Maryland she serves as the choreography director, copywriter and mistress of ceremonies for all of our performances, and a lead in the double quartet Just In Time. Also, each year for our board installation she authors a story that takes place in "Heartland" and serves as the mistress of ceremonies for the installation. Vicki is a past chorus president and show chairman. Asked how she discovered women's barbershop and the Hearts, she replied, "My daughter was in college and she was constantly reminding me I was going to be an 'empty nester' soon. She wanted me to find an activity that was not school-related. I love singing. I sang in

choirs and glee clubs throughout my life, including the University of Maryland glee club. I happened to learn about the Heart of Maryland, so I gave the chorus a call. The Hearts had a show that weekend which I attended, and I was amazed. I went to rehearsal and then to a retreat that the chorus had the next weekend, and I have been going ever since."





Of course the star rookies are Carson and Kaitlin, whom Vicki describes as "almost perfect grandchildren."


JEWELTONES
