#### SWEET ADELINES INTERNATIONAL INTERNATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS 280<sup>TH</sup> (ANNUAL) MEETING

#### INTERNATIONAL UPDATE

The International Board of Directors met on March 2-3, 2018, in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Following is a summary of actions taken.

The charter and chapter membership for the following chapter was authorized:

East Central Harmony Chapter, Region 3, Charleston, Ill., U.S.A.

The Board approved the advancement of Valerie Taylor to International Judging Program Certified status in the Sound Category.

The Board was pleased to learn that eight grants, totaling \$16,300 had been awarded by the Young Singers Foundation Advancement Committee for events that support the advancement of barbershop harmony for young women.

The Board discontinued the requirement that Worldwide Regions reimburse the International organization an additional \$200 for Regional Judging Expenses.

Phoenix, Arizona, U.S.A. was confirmed as the location for the Sept. 26 – Oct. 1, 2022, International Convention and Competition.

The Board approved a partnership with Groupanizer in order to provide discounts for chapter and prospective chapter websites in an effort to assist choruses with membership growth and retention.

The 2018-19 Sweet Adelines International Committee members were appointed (a list of committees with personnel is available on the website: About Us tab, Meet Our Board dropdown – near the bottom of the page).

Never fear, Charlotte to the rescue – Charlotte immediately offered to lead her home, caravan style, which put Joanne more at ease and allowed her to refocus for rehearsal.

Charlotte has always been a great cheerleader and encourager. She epitomizes the Dundalk culture.

## **\$\$\$\$\$** Ready. Set. Grants! **\$\$\$\$\$**

Is your chorus interested in bringing in new funding to support current activities, expand your creative vision, or create new activities? Does your chorus have an interest in accessing funds that you don't have to pay back? If you answered yes to both questions for your chorus, then you should explore grant funding.

Grant-making organizations, particularly in the arts and humanities, want to expand community access to art and music and seek to connect with non-profits, like SAI choruses, that will help them to meet their goals. While some organizations offer grants for a clearly defined event or activity, **some provide operational support grants that can be used for any purpose**. These grants help choruses to expand programming, buy new costumes or set materials, strengthen overall finances, and more.

#### Is Your Chorus Grant-Ready?

Having a grant portfolio requires that your chorus examines closely your goals, how you document your successes, and the extent to which you can engage member volunteers to support a new or expanding grants portfolio.



It's important to ask three important questions: 1) How ready is your organization to start, step up, or strengthen the grants activity? 2) Do you have members who are willing to document chorus activities and achievements and help you to write persuasive and compelling grant applications? 3) Are you willing to invest the time it takes to carry out what you say you will do as per the grant requirements and deliver on the semi and annual reporting of activities?

To ensure success in a grants portfolio, the management team should designate a grants coordinator whose singular focus is to examine, inventory, and expand the chorus' assets (e.g., director bio, management team contact information, activity summaries, audiences reached, organizational goals, success metrics, etc.). These items will be used to write grants and provide evidence that your chorus is worthy of a grant.

Additional items may need to be developed depending on a specific grant's requirements. This may require conducting interviews with chorus and activity leaders to gather additional information to support the application. (CONTINUES...)

Following and teaching (skills transfer) a repeatable grants production process can help ensure that you create efficiencies in how you build, operate, and deliver a successful grants portfolio.

#### **Researching Relevant Grants for Barbershop Choruses**

When you research grants, you need to find grant making organizations that have the **eligibility standards that your chorus can meet**. Examine very carefully evaluation criteria to determine exactly what makes a successful submission. Make sure you read the fine print and immerse yourself in the essence of the opportunity.

Creatively echo the goals of the grant in your application. Know that the fit doesn't have to be a 100% match. You should think somewhat outside of the box, as it may expand the thinking of the review board. Be unique and different in your approach. But, be careful not to go too far outside of the stated requirements and give them a reason to say no to your application. It's a fine line to maneuver.

**Never underestimate the time it takes to find relevant grants**. They do exist, but sometimes it feels like you are exploring a very deep gold mine. You know there's gold there, but you have to do a lot of digging to find it. In addition to aggressive searching on the web using key search terms, you can set up a Google Alert using relevant terms (e.g., grants, music, performance grants, arts and humanities grants) and include your location to further fine-tune the results that you get in that alert.

Once you hit pay dirt, grant **organizations like to establish long-term relationships with grantees**, and while you have to apply year after year, one is likely to experience a higher hit rate/win rate with grant-making organizations that have proof you can deliver on the requirements of their grant.

#### **How Members Can Support the Grant Process**

- Create a chorus "documentation mindset" and a "grants-winning mindset"
- Proactively flag items for the grants coordinator that help tell your chorus story
- Take photos of your audiences to show numbers, type, diversity, etc.
- Take photos of your activities and volunteer contributions
- Actively look for grants and inform the grants coordinator in a timely manner
- Volunteer as a grant portfolio ambassadors to assist the grant coordinator
- Attend foundation grant orientations and workshops for grantees
- Expect information requests from the grant coordinator that substantiate chorus success
- Dream about how you can spend the extra money from winning new grants!

Donna Vincent Roa, the new Grants Coordinator for Harbor City Music Company, wrote this article. In the past five months, she has written one grant request for funds report for an existing grant, submitted three grant applications, and has won one grant master-apprentice folklife arts grant for quartet training.



Later in the show we were invited to sing along with our sisters from Greater Harrisburg dressed as penguins from another Mother Superior.



How does Harbor City Music Company get ready for a competition? What changes have we been making over time? There are many - both big and small. Here are a few...

1. **Setting Goals:** Each January, Master 700 Director, Michael Gellert does a "state of the chorus" message. It helps us get into the mindset/theme of our year. Our ever-planning Creative Team keeps our theme front and center at retreats/rehearsals and even thinks of fun ways to decorate for our chorus meal before each competition!

- 2. Vocal warm-ups: Our talented Music Team has taken over our vocal warm-ups. With a mix of bubbling/belly breathing practice/vowels with music/rounds/thighdraulics—not really a word ©, we get ready to go. As Michael reminds us, "Singing should be spirit soaring, soul freeing!"
- 3. Quarteting: HCMC has made a concerted effort to support anyone who would like to be involved with a quartet. There were quartet matchups to help members find good blending partners. HCMC had 8 quartets involved in the 2018 Regional competition!
  - The extra time these groups put into practicing and getting coaching truly benefits the entire chorus. (AND they sing for us at rehearsals—a fabulous bonus!).

- 5. **Focus on what is important:** Every week, Michael asks us not to sing louder or try harder, but to look deeper into the music.



#### **HEART OF MARYLAND**

At the Region 19 Competition in Hershey, PA in April, Heart of Maryland was pleased that the Region recognized the 25th Sweet Adelines anniversary of our tireless treasurer and jack of all trades (and

master of all) Sally Hausman. In addition to being the ever-vigilant steward of the chorus' funds, Sally also serves on the Costume Committee and manages our Shop with Scrip program. For many years Sally was the baritone section leader and continues to host Music Committee meetings at her home, even though she is no longer a committee member. However, Sally's most notable contribution to our chorus has been to facilitate our affiliation with Rainbow Place of Rockville, MD. (She is pictured with her husband, Eli Nadel)



The mission of Rainbow Place is to provide emergency overnight shelter for women during the winter months and assist them as they transition to a better quality of life. Sally has been a volunteer at Rainbow Place for 2½ years. She has provided a variety of services, including preparing dinner, sorting through donated clothing to determine their usability and compiling results of customer satisfaction surveys. In 2016 Sally discussed with the chorus her involvement with Rainbow Place and asked if we would like to make a monetary donation to the facility. The money would be used for two purposes: to purchase gift cards that the residents could use to buy meals during the day and to assist the Rainbow Place staff with the purchase of various items for the residents, e.g., linens and toiletries. The chorus members donated \$700 and

asked the director of Rainbow Place, Nancy J. Sushinsky, LCSW-C., if we could perform for the residents one evening after dinner. Our performance which took place in January 2017 was very successful and rewarding; the women were very appreciative and we were able to spend time talking with them after we sang. This year we made another donation to Rainbow Place and sang for the residents in February. Our director, Karen Collins, says, "The Hearts love to perform wherever we are asked but singing at Rainbow Place puts a smile on everyone's face and joy in everyone's heart. The best part is the fellowship we enjoy

with the ladies at the end of the evening."

Sally also enlisted several of the members to assist in preparing a dinner for the residents in January. Asked why she devotes her time and energy to Rainbow Place, Sally responded, "I feel very fortunate that I can help Rainbow Place provide a safe, warm and nurturing environment for women in need." Our association with Rainbow Place, which, according to its website, "is dedicated to show and share God's love by providing winter emergency overnight shelter to



women experiencing homelessness," has been very gratifying for us. It allows us the opportunity to sing for a diverse group of women who do not often have the experience of attending a live musical performance. We look forward to future singouts at Rainbow Place and to providing assistance that will improve the residents' lives. 
