TEAM COORDINATOR

THIS IS A RE-RUN OF LAST MONTH'S COLUMN, FOR THOSE WHO MISSED IT.

For those of you that I have not had the pleasure of meeting yet, my name is Irene Hershey and I am currently serving as Team Coordinator on your Regional Management Team or RMT as we affectionately call it. This is my first year in this position as I assumed the role following Sarah Nainan-Newhard. It has been exciting and rewarding to work with this wonderful, exciting group of women that volunteer their time and vast talents to serve this tremendous region. I have been a Sweet Adeline for 15+ years and sing with Vocal Harmonix. I love this region and all of the opportunities that this organization provides for us.

The RMT is a dedicated group of women who work tirelessly to create exciting programs and educational events to reach each and every one of you. We also take our positions and responsibilities to the region seriously. It is our priority to service our members and choruses with the utmost integrity and care. It is also our priority to pay concerted attention to the fiscal responsibilities of the region. We carefully develop, review and monitor the budget of the region to make sure that we can continue to offer quality educational programs as well as a great yearly convention experience.

The world around us continues to change and grow. Regional events are no different. It has become increasingly more and more difficult to contract quality services and locations for the events that we offer at a price the suits our non-profit budget. Your Events Coordinator and the Regional Convention Steering Committee (RCSC) work hard to locate, evaluate and secure appropriate venues to hold the events that we offer each year while keeping costs to a minimum.

This year, as we evaluated our current budget, the RMT had to face the understanding that we needed to take a very close look at the finances associated with our regional events. Traditionally, our FLASH and Singer's School events have been designed financially as "break even" events and had been budgeted accordingly. This keeps costs to you as low as possible. However, it is important to note that when we contract for events with any of our hotel venues, we have to give attendance guarantees in order to get special meal and rooming rates. We have successfully been able to keep costs to each of you at a minimum – but your participation at these events drives our ability to continue to offer awesome experiences at reasonable costs. Simply put, if we don't meet our minimum attendance numbers, we lose money.

Regional Convention has also been a major focus of evaluation for the RMT. The costs for producing this event each year have risen significantly. You may not realize that it takes roughly \$90,000 to produce the convention that we all enjoy so much. A major portion of that cost has become the cost of securing adequate sound, stage, and lighting for the weekend. Again, please know that our Events Coordinator and RCSC work tirelessly to negotiate without compromising the quality and basic needs for a successful event.

In the past, our budget for Regional Convention has resulted in some residual profit which has been used to support other programs and benefits to the region. However, in recent years, convention costs have risen significantly, and we have actually lost money on convention in the last two years. This is despite our consistent efforts to negotiate lower price structures and to save costs. As we continue to plan for future conventions, it is clear that it just costs more to put on convention these days, no matter where we hold it. As a region, we HAVE to be in a position of breaking even at the least for our regional convention. So, the time has come to extend an increase to the registration fee for Regional Competition. The RMT has decided to raise the registration cost per competitor from the current \$75 to \$100. This increase will be effective for the 2019 Convention. Please know that this decision was not made lightly, and was decided only after careful consideration and significant cuts to the budget wherever possible.

We imagine you may have questions for us about this. So the RMT will be holding a discussion forum on Sunday morning of FLASH on Sept 30th. We welcome your participation in that forum. FAQs

Why did we leave Ocean City?

There were a couple of reasons we decided to leave Ocean City:

1. The judges felt that he venue (convention center) was not conducive to receiving good scores. The cement walls of the Hall where the stage was built for many years did were not good acoustically. That issue was mentioned many times in the Judges' notes.

2. Our final year in the brand new Fine Arts Center, while acoustically much more sound, was not large enough for our group. There were seating issues (not enough seats), and the sound system to the audience was not good at all. It turns out, after the fact, that the Convention Center agreed that the sound system that first year had not been calibrated to handle a large musical performance such as our contest, and I have been told it has been remedied.

3. Bussing of choruses to the convention center was quite costly. Close to \$20,000 per year.

Why can't we go back to Ocean City?

Your Events Coordinator and her team continue to investigate possible new venues for convention.

Why did we go to Hershey Lodge if we knew we were going to operate at a loss?

At the time of the signing of the contracts, we, of course, did not know that we were going to operate at a loss. There was a large audio/visual cost that was not revealed to us ahead of time, and when we were made aware of it (after the close of the first convention in 2016), we had already signed a multi- year contract.

If we lose money when we go to Hershey Lodge, then why are we going there again in 2019?

The 2019 contract was signed in 2013. We had no warning of the high audio/visual costs that we would be required to pay. There is a huge monetary penalty to cancel the contract.

Why don't we renegotiate our contract to get the prices down?

Hershey Lodge is not like Ocean City. They do not have a "season" where they are happy to have a large convention come in because business is slow, and thus are agreeable to renegotiate contracts. They are busy all the time and have conventions much larger than ours. Our Events Coordinator is constantly working with both the hotel and our sound/light/audio vendors to lower costs. They have made several concessions to help us.

Can we save money if we get rid of the webcast?

There is a potential cost saving measure being investigated now for streaming of our convention that will be less costly than the webcast. Information will be coming out at a future date.

• It should also be noted that at any venue the negotiations are based on the amount of rooms that we project to "sell" for the event. The facility rental costs depend on the number of sleeping rooms booked. If we fail to book sufficient sleeping rooms, then the function space (including rehearsal spaces) cost extra money.

How much does it cost to operate a convention?

Q: Why do we need to raise the price for the 2019 Convention when this is the last year in Hershey anyway? Aren't we moving to Lancaster because it's cheaper?

A: The need to raise the ticket price is not only related to the specific location of the convention. The increase is based on two issues: increased expenses and declining income. The historic inflationary costs of running our annual convention have reduced the bottom line from profit to loss. We also have had shrinking ticket sales due to a stall in growth of our choruses. In fact, many choruses have experienced a decline in membership. Therefore, an increase in expenses and a decline in income combined have created a difficult position for the financial health of our region. This increase in ticket prices is projected to balance the convention budget and give us a profit to run the other important educational programs that benefit all members.

Q: Isn't there another way to balance the budget? Why charge all of this to the competitors?

A: The budgets for FLASH and Singers' School are created to break even or make a small profit to fund our other educational programs. The Convention is not breaking even at this point so that is our first goal. We cannot cut the expenses of providing a quality stage, lighting and sound. We are finding that most venues now use contracted, unionized sound and lighting companies and will not allow you to bring in your own vendors. The cost of supporting the judging panel is also a fixed expense. We are investigating ways to lower the cost of the webcast.

EDUCATION COORDINATOR Lines from Lori Jo

I was so lucky to be at the 2018 Sweet Adelines International Convention in person. My dear friend, Gwenn Trout, listed me as her Plus One so I sat in the Overtone Society VIP section with fantastic seats. I did not miss any competitors. I enjoyed every single competitor in the Harmony Classic Contest, the Quartet Contest and the Chorus Contest. I even went to the Coronet Club Show to see Lustre become part of the Coronet Club. Class Ring, Sound Design, Famous Janes and the Valley Forge Chorus represented Region 19 very well and we are all proud of their performances. So did I do anything differently than the other 20 International Conventions I attended? I did. Here are highlights from three of the unique things I did while at the St. Louis convention.

Diversity Café: Getting up early to go by myself to this event seemed like a good idea when I signed up weeks earlier. But that morning I really had to drag myself to the room. I'm really glad I went. The discussion was lively and I met some wonderful singers who were eager to have a voice regarding feelings of marginalization within our organization. Most of the small table discussions were about situations at the chapter level in which members were uncomfortable. While we didn't have solutions, we certainly had our eyes opened to the many situations that face our members on a weekly basis. Awareness and personal discussions are the first elements of change and I left the three-hour session with my mind opened even wider than before.

Mixed Harmony Family Chorus: I sang on the stage with the first-ever Mixed Harmony Chorus. The eightpart chorus was short on men so I volunteered to sing the men's Lead part. I love 8-part harmony and remembered singing with Greater Harrisburg and the Keystone Capital Chorus at our Contact Benefit Shows more than 30 years ago. As a director of Vocal Harmonix (SAI) and the Red Rose Chorus (BHS), I really enjoy putting the two choruses together when we have a chance to perform together. This year, that would be five different shows together. But there I direct, not sing. So I SANG on the International stage this year in 8-part harmony. It was wonderful.

Sirens of Gotham Tag Room: Tag singing is great fun. One of the first things I learned at a rehearsal 40years ago was the tag "Please don't give my daddy no more wine, he may be no good but he's all mine". Strange lyrics but fun to sing. Vocal Harmonix is hooked on tags and when I saw that the Sirens were sponsoring a Tag Room on Saturday night, I just had to go. I met a lot of great singers there and realized that many were from Region 19. LOL. Once we learned our tag, we agreed to spread out around the room and meet new people. This is something that I'd love to bring to our region and VHMX is interested in sponsoring something like this in Hershey this year. Want to join us?

These events could happen on the regional level. Chat with me at Singers School if any of these interest you, too. Let's think outside the box together.




